

Four high school students go into the woods one fateful night in 1978. Their bodies are found the next day. Stevie Bell gained minor notoriety for solving the Truly Devious case at Ellingham Academy. Now she's been approached by the new owner of Camp Sunny Pines to solve the Box in the Woods case. Posing as camp counselors, Stevie and her friends Nate and Janelle begin to investigate the murders in the small town of Barlow Corners. Many of the people who were teens at the time of the murders still live in the town. Was it a drug deal gone bad, a revenge killing for the death of another student a few months earlier, or the work of the Woodsman, an infamous serial killer from that time? As in the Truly Devious case, Stevie uses her instincts and investigative skills to uncover the truth about what happened that fateful night. (Grades 9 & up)



### THE MARY SHELLEY CLUB

After a violent home invasion, Rachel Chavez and her mother, who no longer feel safe in their home, move to a new neighborhood and Rachel's mother begins a new job at Manchester Prep. Rachel also enrolls and is accepted to the school on scholarship. Struggling to fit in, Rachel stumbles upon the Mary Shelley Club, a secret society made up of students who orchestrate Fear Tests. Her love of all things horror help in her recruitment to the club. The Fear Tests, which are pranks inspired by horror movies in which students reenact horror movie scenes to scare other students, may begin as harmless pranks, but things escalate quickly and the pranks begin to turn deadly. Not sure what the "threat" is, Maddie decides to stay put and survive the best she can until help arrives. Because her parents will surely realize she didn't make it to the evacuation site and send help, right? As the days turn into weeks, Maddie comes to accept the fact that maybe no one is coming. With the help of her neighbor's dog, she scavenges for food and other supplies to survive as long as she can on her own.
